

Treasurer's Report by Jim Mitchell

Firstly may I say that I am willing to continue as Treasurer. The balance of the income is up just over £ 225 on last year. This figure should however be taken in context as you will see the donations for the year were extremely high. This was due to Jacky's excellent efforts in fundraising for the war memorial restoration. Were it not for this we would be showing a deficit of approximately £900.00 for the year. The reason for this was the expenditure on publications to the tune of approx £2100. We have, however, recouped £94 of this from the sale of the two publications and I have no doubt that in time they will more than pay for themselves. The membership subscriptions were was slightly down on the previous year but not significantly. Unfortunately the application for Gift Aid was unsuccessful. HMRC believe that as there are benefits to membership of the Society we cannot claim gift aid. I do not anticipate any major expenditure this year other than the war memorial costs which should almost entirely be offset from donations. Thank you all for your continued support at raffles and other fund raising events which contribute greatly to the finances of the Society. Re-election of auditor, Mr Bernard Harrington. Proposed by Jim Mitchell and seconded by Kay Brown.

Archivist's Report by Ann Marie Murphy

In the Highworth Community Centre, in the Dormers, the History Room is providing a very useful facility to store documents, photograph, maps and artefacts. We are still in the process of being collated and sorted, which is being undertaken with Diana Sims. We have received documents and photographs during the year including - Postcards, China, donated by Maureen Tanner depicting Highworth and Hannington. Photographs donated by a member of the Camera Club showing various Highworth Events over the years and a document detailing the works schedule to construct Southfield school. We have now in our archive, various artefacts including - A rifle box belonging to Pleydell-Bouverie from the 1st World War, A printed window screen from the Vorda Works, Vehicle plates from Bartrops and printed blocks and plates from Bartrop's advertising material. From our archives we are able to put on displays; for example, Jacky Clark put together a display on the Mat Factory, which was for the 'Made in Swindon' Exhibition at the Swindon Library last October. For the Roman May Day Event this year, we put together a display on the Romans in Highworth Library, in which we used our own artefacts including Romano-British pottery from the Haresfield Site. We also a Roman pot loaned by Mike Stone. Other material was loaned by the Corinium Museum in Cirencester and The Wiltshire Heritage Museum in Devizes. Finally, I would like to thank all those who have loaned, donated items and helped to put together displays. Proposed by Denise Arnel. Seconded by Jim Mitchell.

Webmaster's Report by Paul Newton-Smith

Visits to the website this month: 2507 of which 963 are first-time visitors. Therefore, 1544 are repeat visitors. Visits to the website year-to-date: 16382, 8206 of which are first timers and 8176 repeat visitors - roughly 50:50. Visits this month are from Germany, Canada, Australia, Holland, China and Japan. This month, our Links page has been very popular with About Highworth and Galleries close behind. In addition, there have been a lot of hits on Coleshill House and the Spooky Site. 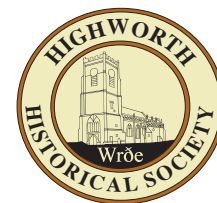

Minutes of Annual General Meeting of Highworth Historical Society Held on September 30th 2013 at the United Reformed Church

The acting Chair, Bryan Lawton acting for Jacky, Jo Clark opened the meeting at 7.30pm by extending a warm welcome to all members after the summer break.

Apologies were received from Jacky Clark (acting Chair) and Jo Clark.

Minutes

The Minutes of the 2012 Annual General Meeting were read by the Secretary, Mrs Kay Brown. They were accepted by the members and signed by the Chairman, proposed by Paul Newton-Smith and seconded by Colin Dawson. Chairman's Report by Jack Clark and read by Bryan Lawton

Well, another year has slipped by at an alarming rate and soon we shall be enjoying a packed programme of events for our 42nd year. This year has seen excellent support from members and from casual visitors, I am sure, because of a very varied and interesting programme imaginatively and ably put together by Denise Arnel. We started the year by exploring the Isle of Wight with Colin Brading and his Steam Railway talk and ended with Daniel Rose and his address about the Mechanics Institution; all interspersed by Medieval Church Paintings, Court Martials in WW1, Medieval Sword Play, the Work of Swindon Photographer William Hooper and Snipers of the Great War. We were fortunate too to have two extra talks - one about the Highworth Pot and the other about the geophysics of the Market Square. Our thanks to Denise for a stimulating and interesting programme.

Our new recruit Martin Summers has really earned his spurs by finding interesting field trips for members which have been thoroughly enjoyed by many. Opportunities to visit Inigo House, Westrop House, Inglesham Church and Bletchley Park were eagerly accepted by members and we hope to do more of this in the forthcoming months. We also hope to have more Quiz nights too. This is such a good fund raiser and we are grateful to our secretary Kay Brown for doing this and making them such fun.

This year has also been one of seizing every opportunity to sell our publications Highworth Town Trail by Jo Clark and Fun Frolics and Festivities by Chris Suter. We sold them on a market stall at the Saturday market, we sold them on the Roman May Day and we had a successful book launch (accompanied by some very tasty cakes!) We sold them in Swindon Library where I did a presentation on the History of the Mat Factory and I sold some more when I plucked up courage and meandered round a few pubs in Highworth. They are, of course, available at the Lighthouse Bookshop and the library and also at our meetings. When we have sold just a few more, we shall publish another tome.

At one of our committee meetings, Jim Mitchell, our Treasurer, advised that the War Memorial was looking very shabby and, to cut an extremely long story short, we obtained permission from the Council to refurbish it. This is a very technical job and requires scaffolding and specialist professionals to do the work. Well, I am delighted to say that behind the scenes fundraising has gathered together the money and the work has been authorised. My challenge to you is for every member to collect £5 - either by enterprise, digging deep in your pockets or asking neighbours for a small contribution. This way, we shall have enough to finish the job and perhaps have a small buffer for ongoing maintenance. Most importantly, we shall have all contributed. When the work is complete, we shall ask the churches and secular organisations to rededicate the memorial.

This year, we have tried to obtain as many membership fees either by post or at the annual meeting. We made this decision to try and keep our costs down and we do appreciate your co-operation in this matter.

I shall not be at the AGM and Dr Bryan Lawton has kindly agreed to chair the meeting this evening. We still need new committee members and, in the medium term, we shall need a Chairman. Please put your name forward if you would be prepared to join us and I will revert to Vice Chairman if a suitable person puts their head above the parapet. The responsibilities are not onerous - just a monthly meeting (in the pub) and if you have a skill we shall, of course, try to persuade you to put it to good use! Finally, thank you to members for their participation and questions and for making the meetings lighthearted and fun. I also thank the committee for all their hard work during the year and not forgetting our archivist, Ann Marie Murphy, who is not a committee member - she is very much appreciated.
